Winterizing Your Yard

"You are living in USDA Hardiness Zone 5. The average minimum temperature is minus 20 degrees Farhrenheit."

Yes, I know it is only
August. However, many
of you have asked us,
"What happened this
year. We had good snow
cover last winter and
that was supposed to
have protected our plants
(trees, shrubs, and
perennials), but we lost
some." Answering that
question... and helping you
avoid similar losses next
year is the reason for
this article.

You are living in USDA
Hardiness Zone 5. The
average minimum
temperature is minus 20
degrees Fahrenheit. We
tend to have some
miserable winds out of the
north and west during the
winter creating wind chills
as low as minus 80 degrees.
This is very stressful on
people and plants alike.
Winterizing issues include
hydration, feeding. pruning,
and disease control.

Hydration. We had a good spring for moisture. The summer has been extremely dry, as was last summer and fall. Lack of moisture was probably the largest single contributor to winter losses this past year. Two seasons of drought will be deadly for your plants; trees, shrubs, lawns and perennials.

Special points of interest:

- Winterizing includes good bydration, feeding, pruning, and disease control.
- Perennials, trees, and shrubs on sale.
- Taking care of birds.

Perennials, Trees, & Shrubs

Fall is an excellent time to plant. The hot weather has been replaced by cool and the plants no longer feel the urge to grown leaves. They can concentrate on roots and build a firm base for next year's growth spurt. Cool weather also means that we do not need to be quite as careful with the watering schedule.

The perennials go on sale September 1.

The trees and shrubs go on sale October 1. Take advantage of this opportunity to add to the value of your property.
